

FROM THE INTERIM PASTOR . . . Rev. Dr. Stephanie Weiner

In prepping for the recent Roundtable on mental health, I read an article by Laura Greenstein on, "The Mental Health Benefits of Religion and Spirituality." Our current context tends to divide them. Some people even take sides for one or the other. At Bethel, our "take on the faith" makes a good case for both, as does Ms. Greenstein. You can go to the webpage of the National Association for Mental Illness, www.nami.org, to read the whole article. Here is a quick summation:

<u>Religion</u> gives people something to believe in, provides a sense of structure and offers a group of people with whom to connect. Research suggests that it reduces suicide rates, alcoholism and drug use. It provides:

Community with social connections, a sense of belonging, and a safe and trustworthy social environment;

Ritual which helps us cope with difficult life situations, provides structure, regularity and predictability, and allows time for rest as well as holidays and seasonal emphases;

Learning by providing guidelines to live by, compassion, forgiveness and gratitude, and life lessons, even in challenging situations.

Spirituality is a sense of connection to something larger than ourselves. It helps us look within and understand ourselves while also figuring out how we fit in with the rest of the world. It incorporates healthy practices for the mind and body which positively influence mental health and emotional wellbeing. Among its benefits:

Individuality which enhances a person's sense of self-empowerment; focuses on personal growth, and accepts any person, whether they are part of a religion or not;

Mindfulness which encourages mediation and self-reflection, leading to a meaningful life philosophy and prompting expression through activities like art, poetry, music, and more.

Unity with surroundings which renews a sense of belonging in the world and inspires appreciation and awareness of our interaction with all around us.

So grateful that Bethel is a both/and church, religious AND spiritual,



News from our May meeting: Leesa Scales, the chair of the search committee, met with us. The committee is working diligently. They've had a number of good candidates and are in the process of insuring that we make the right match with the Spirit's guidance. We will keep you informed. We assure the committee of our support and ask that you keep them in your prayers.

Stephanie's interim contract concludes at the end of June with the month of July as vacation from the year just completed. She has agreed to continue month to month until the end of May 2020. She and we believe we will have a settled pastor long before then. However, if not, she will conclude her ministry May 31, 2020 and we will go to plan B. This is best for her and for us. Stephanie will take the vacation earned during the coming year by taking six weeks off, during the year. The usual contract is four weeks, plus two weeks continuing education, plus we negotiated an extra two weeks in the original contract

As an added part of the contract, given that we are saving money between her contract and the amount we have budgeted for a called pastor, the council approved using the savings for program and promotion of our ministry. MISSIONS TEAM:

New! Isaiah 117: Youth and children have been a passion for me. I was at a conference recently and saw a flyer regarding an Isaiah 117 house. I did not know what this was about but was interested. God nudged me to go to an informational meeting. A lady discussed her concerns with the most vulnerable population today, children in foster care.

Children may be removed from their homes or schools. Case workers may need to take them to the office until a placement or foster family is identified. Sometimes this may take hours or days until a safe place is identified for that child or sibling group. It is a crisis situation where the child/youth may not know where they are going, how long they will be there, and who will be with them. Many children are taken from the home without clothes, belongings, and familiar safe objects.

Isaiah 117 house is a safe place for transition for these children. It is a home setting where clean, fresh clothes may be available. It is a home with a kitchen for meals or snacks, a bathroom to take a shower, a bedroom or two to rest, and living room to spend time with support people and have activities.

Isaiah 117 started in Tennessee, and someone in the Evansville area was moved, as well, by God to "check in to this to help my hurting children." I want the congregation to be aware and add to your prayer list, this endeavor. We can get more information and ask for someone to speak to us if this is a "nudge from God" as we continue to "Seek and Serve God's will." God's Grace is new each day. (Kim Stevens)

Continuing! Habitat for Humanity: We have a family for the fully-funded UCC/DOC/Goins Family home at 114 East Oregon Avenue. Find out more about Jennifer and her family at https://evansvillehabitat.org/homeowner_stories/jennifer-m/.

The build starts Saturday, June 1, with work on the crawlspace and floor system. If all goes well, the house will be done August 10. The work dates are posted at the church, or go to www.evansvillehabitat.org.

We have committed to providing the snacks on the nine days of the build, something simple like popsicles when it is hot and donuts when it is not. Please consider doing this! The church will reimburse the cost, if that helps get you to the site! Sign up electronically to volunteer. Check the dates. They are fluid, with no building in the rain (pun intended).

Ongoing! The Helping Hand Fund: Someone recently asked how the fund is supported. It enables us to help members of our congregation, and the community, with extraordinary expenses. Answer: through gifts in memory or honor of someone or something, special offerings, and special appeals. This is one of the latter. As of May 1 we have expended \$793.61: \$566.30-Vectren; \$147.08-water; \$50.00-food; \$30.23-gas/transportation.

We always verify the need. We always pay directly, never in cash to the person. The utility help is higher – because, well, utility bills are higher. We've also helped stave off cut-offs since it is REALLY expensive to have service restored. All contributions are gratefully accepted.

June Mission Focus: The UCC and our predecessor denominations, The Evangelical, and then Evangelical and Reformed Churches, have always had a place in our hearts for those on the edges of society – and life. We began orphanages that are now homes for youth; settlement houses that are now community ministries; homes for unwed mothers that are now for victims of abuse; and retirement/assisted living/nursing homes. Bethel has been instrumental in two such homes in Evansville. With other Evangelical churches, we helped start The Protestant Home in the 1920's. While it is not directly related to the church anymore, it continues as a not-for-profit. More Bethel members reside there than at any other facility.

Dr. and Mrs. Henry Weiss, of our congregation, birthed the idea of Good Samaritan Home. Their pictures are in the entry way, and windows from "old Bethel" are in the assembly area. The Evansville Tri-state, Lincolnland and Wabash Valley Associations of the UCC actually own Good Sam. It is not-for-profit and, to our knowledge, is the only such facility with a full-time chaplain. We have historically supported Good Sam through our benevolence budget; hence it is our special offering of the month.

We are also having a drive for shirts with dignity. These are large or extra-large men's shirts that are reconfigured to provide a dignified shield from food as opposed to the more common bibs. Have some extra shirts? Bring them! Both facilities always welcome volunteers.




