FROM THE PASTOR . . . Rev. Sam Buehrer

“The Here-and-Now”

Almost without exception as I am beginning my day, before I even crawl out of bed I turn to my cell phone to read the daily devotional that I receive from the Center for Action and Contemplation. This Center is run by Father Richard Rohr. Rohr is a Franciscan priest and mystic who has much wisdom to share about the practice of contemplation and self-emptying. Through his teaching, he expresses radical compassion, particularly for the socially marginalized.

In one of his recent devotionals, he was writing about his understanding of what he believes Jesus meant when Jesus talked about the “kingdom of God” and the “kingdom of heaven.” Rohr is quick to say that Jesus was not talking about a far-off celestial heaven. To back this up, he quotes John 4:35-36, “Look around you, look at the fields; already they are ready for harvest! Already the reaper is being paid his wages, already he is bringing in the grain for eternal life, and thus sower and reaper rejoice together. (Jerusalem Bible). Through this teaching, Jesus is moving us to an understanding that what is most Real and most Eternal, what is God, is already present in the here-and-now. All that we need are eyes to see it and ears to hear it. With this in mind, Rohr goes on to write, “So be sure to be here now—and not somewhere else! If our minds or hearts are elsewhere, nothing really happens to us that matters or lasts.”¹

Through my journey of faith, I too have come to know the wisdom of living in the here-and-now. For when one lives in the here-and-now, that is where grace and love abound. I have only been present with you all now for a few days but in those days I have already experienced what I would call extravagant hospitality and grace. My wife, Ellen, and I look forward to experiencing what is most Real and most Eternal while we are with you all in the coming years. My humble prayer is that God may bless my ministry among you in such a way that all who encounter the ministry of Bethel UCC will get an experience of what is most Real and because of that experience we become more fully alive.

News from the Early Childhood Committee - Carolyn Bennett, Chair

In the March meeting, Leadership Council gave approval for the Early Childhood Committee to develop a budget for a potential Bethel Daycare/Preschool. Since that time, we have been determining the finances involved in running our own Daycare. Our research shows that a Bethel Daycare/Preschool could provide significant net revenue after expenses. We have also made a list of possible start-up costs for equipment and supplies. Early Childhood hopes to present our findings to Council at the October meeting.

Why would we investigate running our own program? One reason is that we would have control over the curriculum. It would be an opportunity to share our faith and values in a way that would be inclusive of all children and parental viewpoints. A second reason is that quality daycare continues to be a huge issue for working parents. Our location makes us available both to the surrounding neighborhood and parents who pass by Bethel on their way to work.
